Holding On, Letting Go An Exploration of Our Lenten Theme

The season of Lent in the Christian church has traditionally been a time of reflection and soul searching, an opportunity to meditate on the life of Jesus and cast a critical eye on our lives and actions to see where we have missed the mark. Like the first disciples, we follow Jesus, watching what he does, listening to what he says, and learning to know both who he is and who we are in relation to him.

Thus Lent is an opportunity to draw near to God, to ponder God's words to us in scripture, to hold close what we value, and to identify with Jesus in his mission. Jesus' self-giving on the cross is a powerful metaphor for our call to turn away from the temptation to make ourselves the center of the universe and choose instead a life of sacrificial love in the world.

While the scripture readings in Lent always bend toward repentance, this year's texts focus particularly on calling back believers who have fallen away. In these passages we see two parallel invitations: (1) to hold on to what is most important and (2) to let go of what is peripheral or gets in the way of further growth.

Sometimes we release the ungodly ways of the culture we so easily take for granted. Sometimes we let go of familiar religious beliefs because they are more human creation and habit than essentials of the faith. At times, it is sin that gets in our way. We may hold on to our pride rather than apologize, or clutch resentment rather than forgive, or defend our own rights while others suffer worse conditions. And sometimes we must let go of something that is truly good—a loved one, a hope for the future, our idea of who we are—to continue to grow and develop as God wishes. We look to Jesus as our model, the one who made himself usable for God by letting go of his very life, entrusting himself to the height and depth, the breadth and width of God's love.

A prominent story this season is the familiar parable of the son who leaves home and the father who waits for his return. This story reminds us of the human condition: of our tendency to wander away from our home in God, sometimes without realizing it, and of God's longing for reunion with all who have strayed. When we remember the prodigal love of our heavenly Parent, we can examine and confess the reality of our lives. As we see God's longing and acceptance, we are drawn into celebrating our relationship with this party-throwing God who takes such delight in our return.
